"I think God called me to SJW to hear and respond to what he wanted me to be - I Joined in June 1995 as part of the admin team 3 days a week around childcare for my 3 children (child minder/nursery and starting school reception) and have actually stayed 29 years through various changes mainly positive. I served under 5 Headteachers - Messrs Toft, Hussey, Hyatt & Quinn before currently Miss Marston. Originally, During the first 9 years I also did a little admin support for examinations before taking over as Examinations Officer in 2004. So that means I have seen at least 20 groups of Year 11 cohorts through their GCSE examinations (that's about 2,400 candidates also some through A levels when we had a sixth form). Even now seeing some of those pupils have their own children and helping those children through GCSEs too! but throughout my time here I have always worked hard, built and had good relationships with all tiers of staff but I always had the pupils' interests at heart looking to give the best outcomes for them in every way of school life.

But before I leave SJW I was so happy that Gandhi, my school house, have triumphed both this year but also at sports day too! I have waited a long time to see it. Well done Gandhi house!

I now look forward to spending more time with my own family and hope to be always part of the SJW family and I hope to come back to visit from time to time".

Mrs Nash received a certificate of thanksgiving for dedicated service to Catholic Education from the Birmingham Diocesan Education Service:

Mrs Nash began working at Saint John Wall Catholic School as a part-time Clerical Assistant on 1 July 1995. She had completed her NVQ Business Administration course, and previously worked as a bookkeeper. This was back when Professor Tim Brighouse was Chief Education Officer, and the Headteacher at Saint John Wall was Mr Toft. Part of Mrs Nash's salary was funded by the Excellence in Cities project. She passed her six month probation and regularly moved up the payscale, and by 1998 she had responsibility of being the examinations secretary, supporting the exams Officer Mr Hack. In October 2000 Mrs Nash was temporarily re-graded up from support staff scale 3 to scale 4 – and earned the princely sum of £6922.77 per year! This re-grade was made permanent in 2003, and Mrs Nash went on to increase her hours in 2004. During that time Mr Hyatt was the acting Headteacher, and then Mr Hussey was appointed. In 2007 Mrs Nash became a full-time examinations secretary with responsibility for the examinations process and examinations policies. This was then re-graded and re-titled as Examinations Officer. Mrs Nash continued in this role and had to cope with significant changes to the location and set up of exams, including introduction of internal assessments, under more new school leaders - Mr Quinn and Miss Marston.

Looking back on her 29 years of service, there are numerous Headteacher and Governor letters in Mrs Nash's file thanking her for her organisation and smooth running of the examinations process. In addition, Mrs Nash has ensured that the school passed all of its JCQ examination board inspections. As a practising Catholic, Mrs Nash has been fervent in her support of the Catholic life of the school. She has established a calm and purposeful atmosphere in exams, always beginning in prayer. She has attended many masses and liturgical events both on site, and elsewhere in the parish. She has also supported with recruitment of exam invigilators by persuading members of her church to apply. Mrs Nash has trained invigilators to actively support the Catholic life of the school, and they too are keen to attend mass where possible. Mrs Nash helps out with duties at break and before school to ensure pupils are safe, and she always takes great care to support pupils' wellbeing during the stressful examination period. Mrs Nash has been the face of exams for as long as people can remember, and she has shared in the joys and disappointments of so many generations of pupils at the school. She has motivated individual pupils and supported others, and helped to 'educate each and every unique child in her care to hear and respond to what God calls them to be'.

Mrs Page received a certificate of thanksgiving for dedicated service to Catholic Education from the Birmingham Diocesan Education Service:

Mrs Page began working at Saint John Wall Catholic School as a Temporary Science Technician and Casual Exam Invigilator on 7 December 2009. She previously worked in IT, managing field support and IT infrastructure teams – but this suddenly ended in redundancy. In one of her references it says 'Mrs Page will go out of her way to make every effort to communicate with you and make sure that you understand what is required of you'. This certainly proved to be the case as her career progressed at Saint John Wall from lab technician to clerical assistant, and then on to attendance officer in 2011. This role was re-graded in 2012 and included the responsibility that Mrs Page had to present to the school's Catholic life and Pupil welfare committee. During her time as attendance officer, the school's attendance was always above the national trend. Mrs Page worked tirelessly to build relationships with children and their families, and this fully supported the Catholic ethos of the school to be a welcoming and family-friendly community. During a support staff re-structure in 2016, Mrs Page's role was altered to Pastoral and Attendance Officer. This role enabled her to take a fuller part in the pastoral life of the school including supporting Heads of Year and senior leaders with rewards, sanctions, safeguarding and many other aspects of

pastoral care. In 2017, the school introduced external safeguarding audits and under Mrs Page's leadership, attendance and punctuality procedures were identified as a real strength of the school.

During 2017 the Headteacher struggled to find a suitable replacement for her PA who had retired. So, Mrs Page was persuaded to undertake the role of Headteacher's Support Manager.

In this role, Mrs Page has played an integral part in the Catholic life of the school, not just for pupils but staff aswell. Mrs Page makes every effort to get to know staff and understand their personal circumstances. She supports them with real compassion and empathy. Mrs Page takes a thoughtful approach to cover to ensure the most suitable staff are used, to ensure the best education of our pupils. Through this work, she has helped the school staff absence to be incredibly low, and much lower than other schools. Mrs Page is the person who writes the Catholic life thankyou letters for staff. She embraces the Catholic life of the school, attending masses, trips, visits, House activities etc. she is the face of the school for visitors and when liaising with Fr Subba. Mrs Page is a professional and personal support to the senior leadership team - she is the one who makes the tea and provides the chocolate! She is the person who welcomes the CSI and Ofsted inspectors. Mrs Page is the person who welcomes interviewees and new staff to the school. All external visitors comment on the welcoming atmosphere in the school, and Mrs Page is a key part of that. I am sure that most people at the BDES will have spoken to Mrs Page or met her on one occasion or another. It is difficult to put into words how much she has done for the school, staff and pupils. She will be greatly missed by us all. Mrs Page helps create that atmosphere so that she and our staff are able to 'educate each and every unique child in their care to hear and respond to what God calls them to be'.

Mr Bhogal has been employed as a part time Panjabi teacher at Saint John Wall since 26 April 2011. He had previously taught at Handsworth Wood Girls' and Handsworth Wood Boys' schools for 16 years. During his 13 years of service at Saint John Wall he has supported numerous pupils to take pride in speaking their home language. He has also helped many to gain a GCSE qualification, and several to gain the A level qualification too. Many pupils gained the highest grades in these qualifications. For some of our new arrivals this has been their chance to feel success in the British education system, when perhaps their English did not enable them to gain high grades elsewhere.

Mr Bhogal has fully supported the Catholic ethos of the school. He has helped to communicate with pupils whose parents did not speak very good English. He has helped to explain the expectations of a Catholic school regarding prayer life and religious education. He is a role model of our SJW values. He has always demonstrated respect and understanding of other faiths and has encouraged community cohesion. Mr Bhogal has been generous to pupils and staff. Mrs Forde also received a certificate of thanksgiving for dedicated service to Catholic Education from the Birmingham Diocesan Education Service:

Mrs Forde began working at Saint John Wall Catholic School on 24 September 2007 having completed her teacher training at Newman College of Higher Education (now Newman University). She qualified to teach all primary subjects and KS3 ICT to pupils aged 7 to 14, and was taken on temporarily as a 'General Classroom Teacher' at Saint John Wall, to cover a maternity leave. Mrs Forde successfully completed her NQT induction period and was then given a permanent post in September 2008. Mrs Forde began to make a significant contribution to the Catholic life of the school when she undertook a Head of Mandela House role in 2011. This involved planning and co-ordinating events for Mandela House on 'Fete Day' and Sports day, plus other fund-raising and competitive activities. During this time she started to teach maths and in 2014 she was awarded a TLR as Pupil Achievement Co-ordinator, to work particularly with disadvantaged pupils. This enabled her to use her talents in building relationships and motivating pupils from the most deprived backgrounds to succeed in maths. She had good success with interventions which subsequently helped the school on its journey to improved outcomes, higher numbers of pupils achieving GCSEs in both English and Maths, and ultimately improved life chances for pupils. Mrs Forde's lessons were regularly visited as examples of best practice when the school hosted leaders from other schools for Progress8 Conferences and other partnership events.

Looking back on her 17 years of service, there are numerous Headteacher and Governor letters in Mrs Forde's file thanking her for her contribution to the Catholic life of the school, her participation in the Section 48 inspection, her winning form Prayer Corner, and her dedication to her tutor group.

Especially commendable is her care and empathy for pupils who are growing up in challenging circumstances. For several years Mrs Forde voluntarily set up a breakfast club. She sourced free donations from local bakeries and shops, and provided toast and drinks for pupils who otherwise wouldn't have a breakfast at home. Any left-overs would be made into sandwiches and handed out at break time on the playground. Mrs Forde also ran gift stalls at certain times of the year e.g. Mothers Day and Christmas. These stalls had affordable items on sale that pupils could purchase so that they were able to give presents to their relatives during those times. Mrs Forde used any profits from the stalls to buy her tutor groups treats and donate to school fund.

Mrs Forde will be retiring this summer. During her 17 years at SJW, she has touched the lives of many pupils and no doubt made a difference to their outlook and opportunities – she has truly helped to 'educate each and every unique child in her care to hear and respond to what God calls them to be'.






Dear Parent/Carer

Re: National Framework for Penalty Notices for school absence

I am taking this opportunity to write to inform you of some important changes the Department for Education is introducing regarding school attendance and the issuing of penalty notices when children are absent from school.

A new National Framework for Penalty Notices has been being introduced. The new regulations will come into effect from the 19th of August 2024. The aim is to improve consistency in the use of penalty notices across England.

The national framework includes:

- A single consistent national threshold for when a penalty notice must be considered of ten sessions (usually equivalent to five school days) for any unauthorised absence within a rolling ten school week period. The 10-week period may span different terms or school years. For example, two sessions of unauthorised absence in the summer term and a further eight during the autumn term.
- An increase to the rate of a penalty notice from £120 to £160 if paid within 28 days and £60 to £80 if paid within 21 days. If a second penalty notice is issued to the same parent for the same child within a rolling three-year period, the notice will be charged at the higher rate of £160 with no option for this second offence to be discharged at £80.
- A national limit of two penalty notices that can be issued to a parent for the same child within a rolling three-year period, so at the 3rd (or subsequent) offence(s) another tool must be considered (such as prosecution or another attendance legal interventions).

This means that if you have applied for a leave of absence to take place from September 2024 and the school has not agreed to authorise it, you may receive a penalty notice at the level prescribed by the new framework.

Please be aware that new legislation does not allow schools to authorise any holidays in term time or authorise leave retrospectively.

The local authority is in the process of consulting with schools and partner agencies to develop a revised local code of conduct. The document will be published on Birmingham City Council's website.




















