Message from Chair of Governors

"Hope of deliverance from the darkness that surrounds us."

Term is ending a little later than normal with Christmas Day just around the corner. Throughout the last four months governors have been kept busy with such a lot going on at Saint John Wall.

I recently came across a survey of almost 40,000 parents and carers. It showed that clear communication and feeling heard are their most significant concerns. We are more than aware of how important the relationship is between home and school. I hope, therefore, these half-termly reports give you a flavour of some of the work our governors do. Any thoughts or comments you might have are welcome so please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Nationally, school attendance remains a major worry. A recent report from the Children's Commissioner for England emphasised how attendance has not yet returned to prepandemic levels. It was reassuring, therefore, to hear from Mrs Crooks that our pupil attendance is above the national average. This is particularly crucial for Year 11 pupils as the report demonstrated once again how good attendance greatly increases their chances of gaining good qualifications.

On that subject Mr Holder provided governors recently with a comprehensive report of how our Year 11 pupils are currently progressing. With the exception of a few (and indeed it was a very few) individuals the whole year group has bought into what staff are asking of them.



The pupils are smart enough to appreciate the success their teachers have had over the past few years. It has enabled pupils to achieve great things and in so doing access high levels of education and training. In the depths of winter May feels a long way off but both staff and pupils are already striving to match the high standards of last year and indeed previous ones. Mr Holder also outlined the plans the school is implementing using the pupil premium funding we receive to support disadvantaged pupils.

As well as the impact on pupils' attendance mentioned earlier, the Covid pandemic has also had a negative impact on the well-being of pupils who have returned to school. The effect of the lockdowns has meant some have experienced difficulty settling back to the routine of studying and working with others. There are many reasons for this. The governors were informed by Mrs Breslin of the brilliant work she is doing, along with her colleagues, to find ways of encouraging pupils to find ways of coping better with school life. I'm sure they will benefit greatly from the guidance being offered to them.

At another meeting Miss Timmins reported how the good behaviour of pupils not only in lessons but also around school is being rewarded and leading to them meeting their targets. She highlighted how sanctions are applied to the small minority of pupils who are unwilling to co-operate and so mend their ways. A relatively recent and worrying trend in schools nationally is vaping. You may have heard about it. Miss Timmins has made very clear to pupils that if any are involved in this illegal, unhealthy and harmful activity they will face very serious consequences.

I am delighted to announce that Miss Turner has become a governor here. She brings an enormous amount of experience from a wide variety of schools strengthening even further our governing body. Miss Turner's insight particularly regarding curriculum matters is already proving invaluable. She heard along with other governors at a recent meeting Miss Hanson and Miss Lally outline how the curriculum being offered to our pupils is being remodelled. In so doing it addresses a comment from our recent Ofsted report which stated that: "In a few instances, leaders have not ensured that teachers know precisely how new knowledge draws on what pupils have learned before." It is an ambitious project to be rolled out gradually over the coming years. Governors agreed it will enhance even further the quality of pupils' education.

Mr Lloyd-Price, Mrs Ellis and Mr Lysaght have organised loads of events during this Advent. To discover more about the wonderful work that is being done the weekly Friday Newsletter is always worth reading.

Just one example is the Year 7 Sanctuary Team's work with St Chad's Sanctuary. I'm familiar from my own parish of the incredible work it does supporting refugees and asylum seekers in Birmingham. All that the school is doing will contribute to CAFOD's Live Simply Award which the school is seeking to be awarded next year.

As the year draws to an end and we get the chance to look back at 2023 we can all agree it has globally been a turbulent and troubling twelve months. What a contrast to the year all at Saint John Wall have experienced. Not only were we presented with the prestigious School of Sanctuary Award but we also enjoyed (if that's the right word?!) an extremely successful Ofsted inspection topped off with our best ever exam results. Oh, and I nearly forgot to mention, the stunning refurbishment of our PE facilities – it was worth the 60 year wait!

We owe Miss Marston and her marvellous team of staff an enormous debt of gratitude for all the tireless work they do day-in and day-out. Each has earned a well-deserved rest. So on behalf of all governors, I wish them, yourselves and your families a joyful and peaceful Christmas and a Happy New Year. See you in 2024!

Until then I'll finish with this prayer:

Almighty God through the gift of your Son, our Lord Jesus, we follow you on the path of dawn. Enlightened by your love and wisdom, help us to lead each other back to your open arms. Strengthen our resolve to work for change in our world and to share the hope your Son's birth brings each Advent. Help deliver us all from the darkness that surrounds us.


